Yale Navigation Center

- Began transitioning participants on Friday, 1/29/21
- Shelter and supportive services
 for up to 425 individuals and
 couples experiencing
 homelessness in the Central
 Service Planning Area
- Current capacity is 250 to accommodate for COVID-19 protocols
- People Assisting The Homeless (PATH) is the operator

Project Roomkey

- The County of Orange continues to operate:
 - Temporary isolation shelters for individuals experiencing homelessness who are COVID-19 sick or symptomatic
 - Congregate shelter site for individuals experiencing homelessness who are COVID-19 positive
- Total capacity to serve 275 individuals
- Referrals into the program are made by Public Health Services, hospitals, shelters, street outreach teams, and law enforcement

Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) Program

Overview

- Assists households unable to pay rent and utilities due to the COVID-19 pandemic
- ERA Program funds to be provided directly to the States, US. Territories, local governments with more than 200,000 residents

Funding Allocation

- County of Orange received an allocation of \$65,576,556 from the U.S. Department of the Treasury
- State of California received \$1,497,605,326.90

Eligibility

A renter household in which at least one or more individuals meets the following criteria:

- Qualified for unemployment or has experienced a reduction in household income, incurred significant costs, or experienced a financial hardship due to COVID-19;
- Demonstrates a risk of experiencing homelessness or housing instability;
- Has a household income at or below 80 percent of the area median income (AMI); and
- Assistance is not duplicative of any other federally funded assistance.

Continuum of Care (CoC) Program Update

- FY 2020 CoC Program Funding Announcement
 - On Friday, January 29, 2021, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) announced FY 2020 awards for the 2021-2022 operating year.
 - The Orange County CoC has been awarded a total of \$28,994,983 in renewal funding for all grants scheduled to expire in 2021.
 - This reflects an increase of \$2,851,779 in funding
- FY 2021 CoC Program Registration
 - On January 12, 2021, HUD announced the opening of the CoC Program Registration Forms for FY 2021
 - The Office of Care Coordination has completed this step.

Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) Updates

- HMIS User License Fees
 - 2-1-1 Orange County will be sending reminder invoices to HMIS participating Agencies who have not submitted payment
 - Invoices are due March 19, 2021
 - Thank you to all agencies who have submitted payment to date
- HUD Reporting
 - Longitudinal System Analysis (LSA) data was submitted
 - System Performance Metrics (SPM) report for 10/1/2019 to
 9/20/2020 is complete and will be submitted by deadline

Inter-Agency Data Sharing Agreement

- 2-1-1 Orange County, as the HMIS Lead updated the Inter-Agency Data Sharing agreement at the recommendation of County of Orange County Counsel

Coordinated Entry System for Individuals Request For Proposals (RFP) Updates

- RFP closed, and review and negotiations completed
- Goal is to provide infrastructure and facilitate the streamlining access to services and improving care coordination.
- Contract with Friendship Shelter was approved on February 23, 2021, to provide these services Countywide in partnership with Mercy House

COVID-19 Homelessness Response Funding

- Maximizing Funding Available
 - Expenditures December 30, 2020 paid with CARES Act funding
 - Letter of Agreements for the provision of Alternative Shelter Placement will continue to be an available resource to the Continuum of Care Providers
- Approximately 16,989 alternative shelter nights have been provided since the program was implemented
- Currently assisting 115 households with alternative shelter
 - o 59 families experiencing unsheltered homelessness
 - 56 individuals at high risk for severe COVID-19 illness
- Approximately \$1 million of \$1.2 million has been committed to date

 - South Service Planning Area: Family Assistance Ministries

The Care Plus Program (CPP) is a collaborative care coordination program for those most vulnerable across the County.

CPP aims to expedite the identification of needs and complete successful linkages to services and resources by utilizing a Multi-Disciplinary Team approach.

This program used to be referred to as System of Care Data Integration System (SOCDIS)

CPP Technology Solution

- •The technology solution is an integrated data platform that combines data from County source systems:
- Integrated holistic view of the client
- Cloud-based, mobile care coordination shared by all team
- Multi-disciplinary team participation and referral capability

- •The current users of the system are agency representatives from County departments who work with individuals experiencing homelessness

Orange County United Way Data Release Request Zulima Lundy, CoC Manager Becks Heyhoe, OC United Way

Background

- OC United Way requests aggregate data from HMIS on households that entered and exited homelessness
- The reporting period for the request is from January 1, 2020 to December 31, 2020.
- OC United Way will utilize the data to share with the United to End Homelessness Leadership Council, OC United Way's Homelessness 101 classes, Scorecard and will be available on the United to End Homelessness and OC United Way's websites.

Background

 According to the HMIS Policies and Procedures, requests for data must be reviewed and approved by the CoC Board prior to the data being released if the request meets any of the criteria below:



For the **3,961** who were unsheltered:




