HEALTHCARE IN ACTION

OVERVIEW.

Healthcare for patients experiencing homelessness

- Our medical group provides care to those 18 and older, who are experiencing homelessness in Garden Grove.
- We serve patients experiencing homelessness through an innovative "street medicine" approach by contracting with Medicare and Medicaid health plans as well as hospitals and health systems.
- Healthcare in Action operates during regular business hours: Monday – Friday, 8:00am – 5:00pm.



PROGRAMS & SERVICES

Community Supports (CS)

- Peer Navigators assist patients with being "Document Ready"
- Document Ready such as: Birth Certificates, IDs, etc.
- CS also assists with Housing Navigation

Enhanced Care Management (ECM)

- Peer Navigators assist patients with Medical Appointments.
- ECM also assists with medical referrals and sometimes accompanying patients to medical & social services appointments outside of our street medicine unit.

Medical Care Team

- Consists of a Medical Director, Physician Assistant, Registered Nurse and Licensed Clinical Social Worker (LCSW)
- Provides medical care to people experiencing homelessness, meeting with patients, performing physicals, patient education, diagnosis of illness(es)
- To order and interpret laboratory tests and X-Rays, prescribing medications, developing and managing treatment plans.



PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- Program participation is voluntary.
- Peer Navigators utilize the "canvas approach" and offer the opportunity to engage in a conversation and rapport building.
- After the individual agrees to enroll in the program, the peer navigators will assist with paperwork which includes consents, insurance information, etc.
- The goal of canvassing is to get to know our patients/individuals, meet with them and understand their current needs.
- If program enrollment is to be denied the first time, there will be efforts to engage and enroll during future encounters.

What is **CARE** Court?

Community Assistance Recovery & Empowerment

Care Court is a **"new civil court process"** established to:

- Focus counties and other local governments on serving persons with untreated schizophrenia spectrum or other psychotic disorders.
- Provide behavioral health and other essential resources and services.
- Protect self-determination and civil liberties by providing legal counsel and promoting supported decision making.
- Intervene sooner in the lives of those in need to provide support.

Who does this program serve?

- Adults, 18 years or older.
- Diagnosed with a Schizophrenia Spectrum and Other Psychotic Disorders.
- Currently experiencing behaviors and symptoms associated with severe mental illness (SMI).
- Not clinically stabilized in on-going voluntary treatment.
- At least one of the following:
 - Unlikely to survive safely without supervision and condition is substantially deteriorating.
 - Needs services and supports to prevent relapse or deterioration, leading to grave disability or harm to others.
- Participation in CARE Plan or Agreement is the least restrictive alternative.
- Likely to benefit from participating in a CARE Plan or Agreement.



Who can petition?

Family/Home

- Persons with whom respondent resides.
- Spouse, parent, sibling, adult child, grandparents, or another individual in place of a parent.
- Respondent (i.e. self petition)

Community

- First responder (e.g., firefighter, paramedic, mobile crisis response, homeless outreach worker)
- Director of a Hospital, or designee, in which the respondent is hospitalized.
- Licensed behavioral health professional, or designee treating respondent for mental illness.
- Director of a public/ charitable organization providing behavioral health services or whose institution respondent resides.

County

- County behavioral health director, or designee
- Public Guardian or designee.
- Director of adult protective services or designee.



- Director of a California Indian health services program, California tribal behavioral health department, or designee.
- Judge of a tribal court located in California, or designee.


How to file a petition?



- Complete petition (CARE-100) remember to fill out <u>ALL</u> requested information.
- <u>Additionally</u>, provide the required documentation.
 - Completed Mental Health Declaration (CARE-101) from licensed behavioral health provider <u>OR;</u>
 - Evidence the respondent was detained for a minimum of <u>TWO</u> periods of intensive treatment (WIC 5250 holds), the most recent episode being within the last <u>60 days</u>.





IMPACT ON EDUCATION

- 42% of children experiencing homelessness are under age six
- Have three times the rate of emotional and/or behavioral problems than their peers
 - Twice as likely to repeat a grade, be expelled or suspended 1
- With each change in schools, is set back academically by average of four to six months
 - 87% increased likelihood of dropping out of school
 - Less than one out of four youths graduate from high school! 2

THE MCKINEY-VENTO ACT **EDUCATIONAL LAW**

Authorized under Title VII-B McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act from 1987 and reauthorized in December 2015 by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)



PRESCHOOL - 12TH GRADE

All homeless school-aged children are entitled to the same free and appropriate public education that is provided to non-homeless students


All schools are required to remove barriers to the enrollment, attendance, and academic success of homeless students



Every district nationwide must have a Liaison to identify and serve students

Qualify for academic support: school supplies, food programs and transportation





Immediate and equal access to preschool - 12th grade public education

DEFINITION OF HOMELESSNESS

The Housing and Urban Development (HUD) definition

"an individual who has a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for, or ordinarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings."


The McKinney-Vento Act defines a "Homeless" student as one between 0 - 22 years of age, who lacks a FIXED, REGULAR, AND ADEQUATE nighttime residence, and might include:

Temporarily doubled up: sharing housing due to economic hardship or lose of housing

Motels/Hotels Shelters: Emergency or transitional



Unsheltered: Cars, bus or train stations, parks, camp grounds, beach, abandoned buildings, U substandard housing, public placed not designed for humans to live, abandoned, runaway or pushed-out youth





Education

Section 725 of Subtitle VII-B of the **McKinney-Vento Act**


UNDERSTANDING "DOUBLED-UP" FAMILIES

"...individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence (within the meaning of section 103(a)(1)); and (B) includes — (i) children and youths who are sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason;

Nationally 75% students are doubled up Orange County 89% students are doubled up

EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS





Even if you have:

Uncertain housing:

- · A temporary address
- No permanent physical address

You are guaranteed enrollment in school by the federal McKinney-Vento Act and California state law if you live:

- In a house or apartment with more. than one family due to loss of housing er economic hardship.
- · With friends or family because you are a susaway or an unaccompanied youth
- In substandard housing (without) electricity, water, or head!
- In a shelter Samily, demostic violence. at youth shelter or teansitional living. program)
- · In a motel, hetel, or weekly rate housing
- In an abandoned building, in a car, at a carepground, or on the streets

You can enroll in school immediately even without the documents normally required for enrollment, such as:

- · Proof of residency
- Immunization records or other required health repords.
- School records
- · Legal guardianship papers

Your child may:

- Participate fully in all achool activities. and programs for which he/she is eligible.
- · Receive transportation to and from the scheel of origin if you request it.
- · Centinue to attend the school in which he/she was last enrolled even if you have moved away from that school's attendance area.
- · Quality automatically for school nutrition programs.

Your responsibilities are to:

- Make sure your child gets to school on. time and ready to learn.
- Stay informed of school sales. regulations, and activities.
- · Centact the horeeless laisee for assistance in removing betriers to your child's education.
- Attend parent/handhar conferences. Back-to-School Nights, and other scheel-related activities.

Unaccompanied youth age **14 and over** have the right to access/consent to disclose their school records and extends these rights to all caregivers

Under the law, a homeless student is eligible to:

- Continue to attend their school of origin, if requested by you and it is in the best interest.
- Receive transportation to and from their school of origin, the same special programs and services, if needed, as provided to all other children, including free meals and Title I.
- Receive the full protections and services provided under all federal and state laws, as it relates to homeless children, youth, and their families.

Safe Haven Overview


- Opened February 2022
- 103 youth entered / 81 exits
- Only shelter for youth experiencing homelessness in OC
- Waitlist 177 youth (over 5 months)
- Ages 18-24
- 25 beds
- Housing First/Low Barrier
- Individualized length of stay
- Case Management
- Linkages to health care, mental health, substance use support, employment, education, legal
- Weekly community lunch
- No curfew
- Outings, activities, events
- Day services to youth on the waitlist – meal/shower/resources etc





Safe Haven Program Model

- Relentless engagement focusing on strengthening relationships
- Absolute respect / unconditional love
- Trauma impact
- Motivational interviewing and stages of change
- Youth voice and choice youth are the experts in their own lives
- Success Planning youth led
- Harm reduction
- No limit on times youth can enter
- Don't tolerate racism, homophobia, transphobia, bullying, violence, threats of violence or exploitation



Rapid Re-Housing Overview

- Started November 1st 2022
- 13 youth housed / 5 navigation
- Youth ages 18-24 experiencing homelessness
- Staff: 1 x Housing Navigator, 2 x Case Managers
- 40 youth supported over 2 years 20 youth 1^{st} year / 20 youth 2^{nd} year
- Matched through TAY Coordinated Entry System (CES)
- Up to 2 years support Flexible depending needs of each youth
- Different housing options; 1-bedroom apartments/studios/rent room in shared housing
- Deposit/move in costs covered
- Lease in youth's name/monthly rent paid to landlord by Covenant House
- First 3 months rent paid rent contribution scale increases 10% after 3 months
- Case Management/Success Planning linkages mental health, employment, education
- In home/community meetings (Starbucks, grocery shopping)
- Workshops, resources and events to create a TAY community of support



Rapid Re-Housing is Housing First

Covenant House believes young people should never need to prove themselves before being provided resources and supports to obtain housing. RRH removes barriers to young people accessing housing by not placing preconditions that create barriers in the first place, this is known as **housing first**.

Youth are never required to demonstrate any sort of readiness to participate in RRH:

Not a Requirement

- Income
- Sobriety
- Employment
- School enrollment
- Mental health treatment

Program Acceptance

- Poor (or no) credit
- Poor rental history
- Minor criminal convictions
- History of domestic violence

It is the belief of Covenant House California RRH Program, that young people are most urgently in need of a safe and stable place to reside, and when that residence is achieved, the supportive services needed to ensure sustainability can be delivered over time.

What is a Point In Time Count?

A National Movement. Everyone Counts OC is part of a national effort to better understand homelessness. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires all 400+ Continuum of Care jurisdictions across the nation to complete a biennial unsheltered count and an annual sheltered count of all individuals experiencing homelessness in the community at a single "point in time".

Sheltered and Unsheltered Count

- Sheltered Count: Sunset on Monday, January 22, 2024, to sunrise on Tuesday, January 23, 2024
- **Unsheltered Count**: Tuesday, January 23, 2024, to Thursday, January 25, 2024
 - Survey-based count, goal is to survey all people experiencing unsheltered homelessness
 - Volunteer surveyors visit pre-identified "hotspots" where people experiencing homelessness are expected to gather
 - Surveyors deployed from local deployment centers to all 34 cities, plus unincorporated areas
 - Access centers for Families and Transitional Age Youth
