Targeted Outreach for Veterans Eric Richardson, Chair

Older Adult Veterans (age 62 and older): 61 total

- 35 veterans are off the streets
 - 5 veterans housed
 - 30 veterans in other temporary accommodations
- Of the remaining 26 older adult veterans:
 - Teams are continuously working with 12 unsheltered veterans
 - 4 veterans have had no contact so far
 - 10 veterans were removed from By Names List (BNL) due to no contact

Veterans Whose Length of Homelessness is 10+ years: 15 Total

- 8 veterans are off the streets
 - 4 veterans housed
 - 4 veterans in other temporary accommodations
- Of the remaining 7 veterans whose length of homelessness is 10+ years:
 - The teams are continuously working with 2 unsheltered veterans
 - 2 veterans have had no contact so far
 - 3 veterans were removed from BNL due to no contact

Veteran Families with Minor Children: 19 Total

- 6 veteran family households are off the streets
 - 3 veteran family households housed
 - 3 veteran family households in other temporary accommodations
- Of the remaining 13 veteran families with minor children:
 - The teams are continuously working with 7 veteran family households
 - 4 veteran family households have had no contact so far
 - 2 veteran family households were removed from BNL due to no contact

Individual Adult Veterans who are Chronically Homeless

- The definition of chronically homeless is an individual with a disability who lives in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter, and has been homeless and living as described for at least 12 months* or on at least 4 separate occasions in the last 3 years, as long as the combined occasions equal at least 12 months.
 - Disabling conditions can be mental illness, substance use disorder, or physical disability, etc.
- Currently there are 59 veterans experiencing chronic homelessness that are not over the age of 62, in veteran family households, or have 10+ year of homelessness. Outreach teams will target the veterans experiencing chronic homelessness and will prioritize the veterans with the longest length of homelessness first.

What is a Point In Time Count?

A National Movement. Everyone Counts OC is part of a national effort to better understand homelessness. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires all 400+ Continuum of Care (CoC) jurisdictions across the nation to complete a biennial unsheltered count and an annual sheltered count of all individuals experiencing homelessness in the community at a single "point in time."



Why do a Point In Time Count?

Everyone Counts OC is an opportunity to collect current information on homelessness in our community, including:

- Number of people experiencing homelessness in Orange County
- Where homeless neighbors are located
- Robust demographic information
- Subpopulation information on groups such as Veterans, Transitional Aged Youth, and Families.

- County of Orange including County Executive Office, Health Care Agency, Social Services
 Agency, OC Community Resources, OC Parks, OC Public Works, OC Information &
 Technology, OC Sheriff's Department
- City Net lead agency for unsheltered count
- OC United Way (2110C) HMIS lead agency for sheltered count
- Hub for Urban Initiatives HUD methodology and survey tool design
- Orange County CoC



The Data is Useful

The survey data helps the Orange County CoC and the County of Orange respond more effectively to homelessness in Orange County.

With the collected data, the system of care can:

- Accurately assess the demographics and locations of those in need
- Make informed decisions on housing and shelter interventions (where, what types, and how many)
- Collaborate more closely—from coordinating street outreach and engagement to partnering on case management to shelter operation to housing and supportive services
- Advocate for state and federal dollars to fund interventions


Sheltered and Unsheltered Count

- Sheltered Count: sunset on Monday, January 22, 2024, to sunrise on Tuesday, January 23, 2024
- Unsheltered Count: Tuesday, January 23, 2024, to Thursday, January 25, 2024
 - Survey-based count, goal is to survey all people experiencing unsheltered homelessness
 - Volunteer surveyors visit pre-identified "hotspots" where people experiencing homelessness are expected to gather
 - Surveyors deployed from local deployment centers to all 34 cities, plus unincorporated areas (~400 maps in all)
 - Access centers for Families and Transitional Age Youth

Landlord Incentives and VA's Calendar Year 2023 Goals

• The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) shared the following target goals for landlord incentives in Calendar Year (CY) 2023:

CY2023 Goal	Landlord Incentive Context
Goal 1: Place 35,000 Veterans into permanent housing	Elevate the available housing unit pool and expedite housing placements, especially for those veterans with most significant housing barriers and where inequities exist in access to permanent housing.
Goal 2a: Ensure 90% of those who are housed in CY23 maintain their permanent housing	Incentives can deepen the landlord/provider relationship with landlords more willing to work with veterans and program staff when tenancy issues arise.
Goal 2b: Of those who do not return to homelessness, 95% are rehoused or on a pathway to permanent housing	Recent evictions and landlord challenges are significant screening barriers – particularly for historically marginalized groups – use incentives to convince landlords to lease to veterans even with recent housing challenges.
Goal 3: Engage 28,000 unsheltered veterans	Veterans hesitant to accept VA services or who otherwise may have been screened out in the past may be a core target group for landlord incentives

- 525 veteran households experienced homelessness in Orange County between January 1st 2023 – October 27th 2023
- In the past 12 months there has been a 12% increase in the number of veterans experiencing homelessness


How many veterans are on the OC Veterans Registry?



Homeless Veterans on Veteran Registry




Where are they experiencing homelessness?








How many veterans from the OC Veterans Registry were able to end their homelessness?

- 178 of the 525 veteran households moved into permanent housing between January 1st 2023 October 27th 2023
- 217 veteran households on the registry have been matched to an opportunity to resolve their homelessness:
 - 137 HUD-Veteran Affairs SH
 - **60** Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF)
 - 20 other

Targeted Outreach:


- Leadership: SSVF agencies and VA
- Community partners Outreach teams, Care Coordination: PATH/VOA LA, Healthcare providers
- Bi-weekly case collaborative case conferencing: wider service provision with collaboration
- Joint outreach delivered with real time connections to shelter and temporary accommodation
- Ongoing joint support in temporary housing: collaborating housing search and delivery of Housing First



Veterans Experiencing Homelessness In Orange County Has Increased

There has been a 12% increase in unhoused veterans in 2023 compared to last year in Orange County, according to <u>United to End Homelessness</u>, an initiative of Orange County's United Way.

The nonprofit hosts an annual state of homelessness event. This year's event focused on veterans, using data collected by Orange County's Continuum of Care Program, which coordinates countywide nonprofits and government agencies working to address homelessness.
