## Background



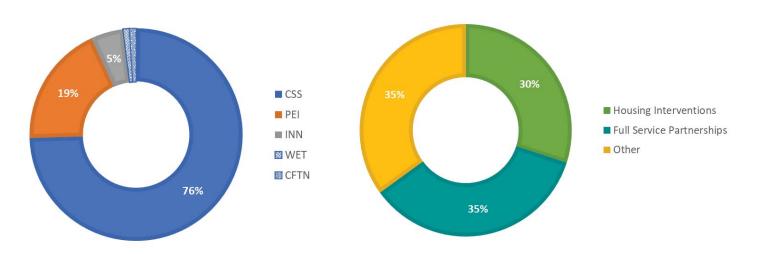
Behavioral Health Modernization was announced on March 19, 2023, as part of Governor's State of the State Tour. Proposition 1 was then voted into law as a single measure to request voter approval of two items:

- Approve a \$6.4 Billion bond
  - Develop an array of treatment, residential care settings, and supportive housing to help provide appropriate care facilities for Californians experiencing mental health conditions and/or substance use disorders.
- Modernize MHSA
  - Update the categorical funding components of MHSA, update name to BHSA, serve SUD clients, focus on homeless, conservatorship, and system-involved individuals.
- The Behavioral Health Services Act (BHSA) has various effective dates and requires a BOS approved BHSA Integrated Plan for FY 2026/27 through FY 2028/29 by July 1, 2026.

## **Impacts**



- **Housing Interventions**: 30% of funds to be used for housing subsidies with a maximum of 25% for capital/build- Currently budgeted \$24.6M for housing, BHSA requires an additional \$27.6M.
- Full-Service Partnership (FSP): 35% of BHSA must be directed towards 24/7 outpatient services- Currently budgeted at \$99M for FSP. The estimated amount of funds allotted to FSP under BHSA is \$60.8M, resulting in a \$35.5M reduction.
- Behavioral Health Services & Supports: 35% of BHSA funds are to be directed towards all other behavioral health supports. 51% of the funding must support programs for early intervention of a serious mental illness with 50% of that funding going towards children & youth. Currently budgeted at \$217M for this component. The estimated allowable is \$60.8M, resulting in a \$150M reduction

## **Process for Changes**



Mitigation Plan- Evaluation Tool, Decision Matrix, Financial Modeling tool Briefing/Discission with the CEOs Office, BOS
Ongoing Communication with Providers, Provider Association
Targeted Meetings with each provider impacted – scheduling has begun Ramp Down
Transition of Care

## **Bond Measure**



Proposition 1 gives \$2 billion to programs administered by the Department of Housing and Community Development (State HCD) and the Department of Veterans Affairs (CalVet); about \$1 billion for veterans and \$1 billion for people experiencing homelessness with behavioral health conditions.

#### Impact:

The bond will increase the available amount for development of affordable and supportive housing which may increase the amount of leveraged funding available for County funded projects.

Proposition 1 changes the formula funding "buckets" to require that 30% of County MHSA dollars be prescribed for "Housing Intervention," of which 25% can go towards capital development

#### Impact:

Loss of local discretion

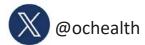
A decrease in local MHSA discretionary dollars for supportive housing development.

The MHSA 3-year spending plan for FY 2023-24 through 2025-26 currently allocates \$40 million for supportive housing development. The change in formula would cap the MHSA funding available to an estimated \$9 million per year, which is a reduction compared to the County's current allocation of MHSA funding for housing development.
