Project-Based Housing Updates

Project Homekey Update Sarah Jones, CoC Manager Office of Care Coordination

Project Homekey Update

- On May 29, 2024, a grand opening event was held for the three Homekey motel conversions (Iluma, Clara Vista and Aurora Vista) completed in the City of Stanton. There was a great turnout and tours of Clara Vista, Aurora Vista and their shared community spaces were provided to attendees.
- HB Oasis, located in the City of Huntington Beach, a Round 2 interim to permanent project, closed on construction financing in May and is now under construction to convert the former Quality Inn and Suites to 62 units of permanent supportive housing.
- The County received a threshold letter from the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) on May 24,2024 in response to the Round 3 application for the Travelodge on Bristol Street in the City of Costa Mesa. They have been working with American Family Housing, the developer, on addressing State HCD's threshold and feasibility comments/questions.

Project-Based Voucher Pipeline

Public Housing Authority (PHA) Representatives

Background

- Four PHAs in Orange County administer the Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Program (also known as Section 8) to help qualified tenants afford healthy and safe housing in the private market:
 - Orange County Housing Authority (OCHA)
 - Anaheim Housing Authority (AHA)
 - Santa Ana Housing Authority (SAHA)
 - Garden Grove Housing Authority (GGHA)
- Each PHA can "project-base" up to 20 percent of the HCVs to develop affordable and permanent supportive housing. However, PHAs may project-base an additional 10 percent of their Annual Contributions Contract (ACC) authorized units above this program limit, provided these units fall into one of the eligible exception categories:
 - Units Made Available to House Individuals and Families Experiencing Homelessness
 - Units Made Available to House Veterans
 - Units Providing Supportive Services
 - Units Located in a Census Tract with a Poverty Rate of 20 percent or less; or
 - Units Made Available to Foster Youth Utilizing Family Unification Program/Foster Youth to Independence Awards

Background

- The Project-Based Voucher (PBV) program is a discretionary component of the HCV program. Under the PBV program, the PHA enters into a long-term Housing Assistance Payments Contract with the owner for a specified number of units for up to a 20-year term, with the option for an additional 20-years.
- Eligible persons are referred from the CES for permanent supportive housing units created with PBVs.
- CES will prioritize individuals and families with the longest length of homelessness in the community and highest service needs determined by CES assessment tools and case conferencing.
- Tenants residing in project-based units pay 30 percent of their income for rent and utilities, and the balance of their housing costs are paid by the PHA. Tenants in project-based units are assisted as long as they live in the unit and continue to qualify for the program.

Tenant-Based Housing Updates

Special Purpose Voucher Updates PHA Representatives

Background

PHAs can set aside HCVs to address homelessness.

The four PHAs in Orange County can also apply for and receive Special Purpose Vouchers from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to serve people experiencing homelessness including:

Mainstream Vouchers

- Mainstream Vouchers (MS5) assist non-elderly persons with disabilities. Aside from serving a special population, Mainstream Vouchers are administered using the same rules as other housing choice vouchers.
- The 2017, 2018, and 2019 Appropriations Acts provided funded for new Mainstream Vouchers. Since 2018, HUD has awarded over \$500 million in funding to PHAs to support 50,000 new Mainstream Vouchers.

Background

The four PHAs in Orange County apply for and receive Special Purpose Vouchers from HUD to serve people experiencing homelessness including:

- Veteran Affairs Supportive Housing Vouchers
 - The HUD-Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) program combines HUD's Housing Choice Voucher rental assistance for homeless Veterans with case management and clinical services provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).
 - Referrals come from the VA Medical Center of Long Beach.

Background

The four PHAs in Orange County apply for and receive Special Purpose Vouchers from HUD to serve people experiencing homelessness including:

- Family Unification Program and Foster Youth to Independence Vouchers
 - The Family Unification Program (FUP) is a program under which HCVs are provided to two different populations:
 - 1. Families for whom the lack of adequate housing is a primary factor in:
 - a. The imminent placement of the family's child or children in out-of-home care, or
 - b. The delay in the discharge of the child or children to the family from out-of-home care.
 - 2. Eligible youth who have attained at least 18 years and not more than 24 years of age and who have left foster care, or will leave foster care within 90 days, in accordance with a transition plan and is experiencing homelessness or is at risk of becoming homeless at age 16 or older.
 - PHAs administer the FUP and/or Foster Youth to Independence (FYI) vouchers in partnership with Public Child Welfare Agencies (PCWAs) who are responsible for referring FUP families and youths to the PHA for determination of eligibility for rental assistance.
 - Referrals come from the Orange County Social Services Agency.

Kennedy Commission Legislative Updates

June 14, 2024



Renter Protections

- Program Prohibits owners of property receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit from increasing rent for a unit over the amount permitted by the program as a result of an increase in the area median gross income. (Currently in Senate Committee on Housing)
- SB 900 (Umberg) Adds "Health" Conditions to the possibility of emergencies that shall be subject to expedient repair requirements by HOAs. Stipulates that these repairs would need to be completed within 30 days of their identification. (Currently in Assembly Committee on Housing and Community Development)
- SB 1011 (Jones) Prohibits individuals from sitting, lying, sleeping, or encamping on a sidewalk or within 500 feet of a school if there is a homeless shelter available. (Failed Passage in Senate Committee on Public Safety; granted reconsideration)

Construction/Preservation of Affordable Housing

- AB 2304 (Lee) Unmasks unlawful detainer cases and eliminates the 60 day access exemption for cases that seek to terminate a mobile home tenancy. (Currently in the Senate Committee on the Judiciary)
- AB 2926 (Kalra) Helps preserve existing affordable housing by requiring owners who receive a bona fide purchase offer from a preservation buyer to either accept the offer or re-restrict the development as affordable housing. (Currently in the Senate Committee on Housing and Judiciary)
- AB 1789 (Quirk-Silva) Authorizes HCD to create loans and grants to rehabilitate and extend the long-term affordability of department-funded housing projects. (Currently in Senate Committee on Housing)

Construction/Preservation of Affordable Housing (Cont.)

- AB 2353 (Ward) Reduces the cost of developing affordable housing by allowing non-profit affordable housing developers to withhold relevant tax payments while their welfare welfare exemption applications are under review. (Currently in the Senate Committee on Revenue and Tax)
- AB 2417 (Hoover) Repeals the House First to create "Beyond Housing" that would offer another tool in combating homelessness by permitting funds to be allocated to programs prioritizing mental health and drug treatment as a prerequisite for participation in a housing program. (Currently in Committee on Housing and Community Development)
- AB 653 (Reyes) Creates a program to provide housing search assistance, landlord incentives, and deposit resources to help tenants with vouchers find and secure apartments in low poverty neighborhoods. (To be voted on in the Senate Floor in August)

Construction/Preservation of Affordable Housing (Cont.)

- SB 1395 (Becker) Allows cities to build faster and cheaper sites to house unhoused individuals through temporary single-room housing. Entends Shelter Crisis Act and Low Barrier Navigation Center laws. (Currently in Senate Committee on Natural Resources)
- SB 1212 (Skinner) Increases opportunities
 for homeownership by barring hedge funds
 and other corporations investment entities
 from buying single-family homes in California
 (Committee hearing cancelled at the request
 of Author)

Financing Affordable Housing

- AB 2638 (Ward) Allows the sale of and refinancing of HCD financed properties under certain conditions determined by HCD to increase funds available for affordable housing. (Currently in Senate Committee on Housing)
- AB 2430 (Alvarez) Density Bonus Law Prohibits cities and counties from charging a monitoring fee on developments subject to the Density Bonus Law (100% Low income units). (Currently in Senate Committee on Housing and Local Government)

AB 2728 (Gabriel) - Requires local
governments to include in their annual reports
specific information related to the number of
applications and permits issued on the planning,
construction, and operation of units on religious
and non-profit land since the passing of SB 4.
(Currently in the Senate Committee on
Housing)

Constitutional Amendments Legislative Year 2024 Bill Updates

ACA 10 Fundamental Right to Housing Recognition by the state of the fundamental
human right to adequate housing for
everyone in California. (Currently in The
Assembly Rules Committee pursuant to Rule
97)

AB 1657 - The Affordable Housing Bond of 2024

- AB 1657 is a \$10 billion housing bond will be allocated in this way:
 - \$7 billion for the Multifamily Housing Program
 - \$1.5 billion for preservation programs
 - \$1 billion for homeownership programs
 - \$500 million for Tribal and Farmworker program
- The reintroduction and passing of AB 1657 is an effective solution to the Governor's proposed cuts to the Multifamily Housing Program
- Currently re-referred to the Senate Committee on Appropriations as a two-year bill.
 - As of March 2024, OC Senators Umberg and Blakespear have signed on as coauthors!!!

November Campaign

Background of ACA 1

Cities have been unable to commence vital infrastructure developments like road maintenance, transportation, or construct affordable homes because bond measures supporting them fail to achieve the 66% voter approval threshold.

- Bond Measures that could have passed with ACA 1:
 - Measure L City of Berkeley: \$650 Million Bond intended to fund affordable homes, repair streets and sidewalks, underground utilities, enhance buildings and infrastructure, and safety. (59.4% voter approval)
 - Measure A City of San Diego: \$900 Million Housing bond for affordable and permanent supportive housing (57.55% voter approval)
 - Measure P City of Los Angeles: \$54 million bond intended to develop and preserve parks, trails in low income communities and fund beach clean-ups. (62% voter approval)
- Local school districts require a 55% voter approval for school bonds to fund the acquisition or lease of real property, or the construction, rehabilitation, and replacement of school facilities and furnishings.

November Campaign

What is ACA 1?

 ACA 1 will lower the constitutional voter approval threshold from 66% to 55% for General Obligation (GO) bonds

Governor's Proposed FY 2024-25 Budget Updates

- Proposes to cut \$6 million of the \$5.2 billion from General Fund investments since 2019
 - Regional Early Action Planning Grants 2.0 -Reverts \$300 million General Fund, eliminating program
 - Multifamily Housing Program Reduces \$325 million General Fund, eliminating program
 - Foreclosure Intervention Housing Preservation Program - Reduces \$474 million from the General Fund, eliminating program
 - Infill Infrastructure Grant Program Reverts \$235 million General Fund, eliminating program
 - o CalHOME Program Reverts \$152.5 million
 - Veterans Housing and Homelessness
 Prevention Program Reverts \$76.3 million,
 eliminating program
 - Housing Navigators Reduced by \$13.7 million

Governor's Proposed FY 2024-25 Budget Updates (Cont.)

- Budget cuts do not include:
 - An additional \$500
 million for the Low
 Income Housing Tax for
 2024-25
 - 2018 Bond dollars
 - ~\$2 billion Prop 1
 funding to Permanent
 Supportive Housing

Governor's Proposed Budget on Homelessness

- Proposes the following budget solutions for the Homelessness Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP) Program
 - Maintains a total of \$1.1 billion General fund for the HHAP Round 5 across 2023-24 and 2024-25, with nuances such as:
 - Delays \$260 million in bonus round funding from 2023-24 to 2025-26
 - Reverts \$100.6 million in administrative savings, leaving \$51.1 million for program administration
 - No HHAP Round 6 Proposed, though it is open to discussion
 - Budget Summer ("A pages") do not specify amount or program
 - Makes further support contingent on recipients making progress on commitments from earlier HHAP rounds
 - No cuts to the Encampment program proposed.
 - No delays related to Health and Human Services programs.

California Affordable Housing Budget Overview

- No New General Fund Funding.
- The gap created by the lack of State funding prevents housing from being built.
 - California is estimated to reduce the production of affordable homes, by a third. A loss of 6,400 homes.
 - California will be leaving \$1.6 billion of federal resources on the table

Programs being eliminated affecting Affordable Housing:

- Multifamily Housing Program
- Infill Infrastructure Grant Program
- Veterans Housing and Homelessness Prevention Program
- Regional Early Action Planning Grants2.0

California Legislature's Counter Budget Proposal

California's Legislature released their counter proposal to the Governor's plan May 29, 2024

 Focused on preserving programs that matter most to Californians: lowering the cost of living, expanding access to affordable housing, and sustaining public services according to Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas

California Legislature's Budget Counter Proposal

The Legislature proposes the following budget changes to housing:

- HHAP \$1 billion to HHAP Round 6 to provide local governments continued funding to combat the homelessness crisis
- Low Income Housing Tax Credits Approves
 \$500 million for Low Income Housing Tax Credit
 Program, as proposed by the Governor
- Rejects proposed cuts to:
 - Multifamily Housing, Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) 2.0, and Housing Navigation and Maintenance Program

Office of Congressman Lou Correa (Jan. 31, 2024)

- Nearly \$35 million in federal tax dollars through HUD's Continuum of Care program for over 10 organizations that provide housing assistance and/or Permanent Supportive Housing
- \$4 million of the funds are to address Orange County's housing crisis
 - \$3 million to the Orange County Housing Finance
 Trust
 - \$1 million for veterans housing assistance

Federal Updates

Biden Administration FY25 Budget Request (March 11, 2024) The FY2025 budget requests \$72.6 billion for the Department of Housing and Community Development, and \$185 billion over 10 years for mandatory affordable housing investments.

Discretionary Funds

- \$241 million for Housing Choice Voucher
 Program
- \$4.1 billion for Homelessness Assistance
 Grants

AH Mandatory Funding

\$15 billion for an Extremely Low-Income
 Housing Supply Subsidy

Federal Updates

Biden Administration FY25 Budget Request (March 11, 2024) Cont.

AH Mandatory Funding over next 10 years:

- \$15 billion for an Extremely Low-Income Housing Supply Subsidy.
 - \$7.5 billion for Project-Based Rental Assistance.
 - \$7.5 billion toward the rehabilitation and preservation of at-risk public housing.
- \$20 billion for an Innovation Fund for Housing Expansion
 - Flexible grants aimed to expand local housing supply, lower rental costs, and promote homeownership
- \$22.3 billion for **Housing Vouchers for Extremely Low Income populations**
- \$3 billion for Sustainable Eviction Prevention
 Reform
- \$8 billion in Homelessness Grants to expand temporary and permanent housing for people experiencing or at risk of homelessness.
- \$3 billion for Emergency Rental Assistance for Older Adults at Risk of Homelessness







COMPARISON OF 2019, 2022 & 2024 POINT IN TIME COUNT


TOTAL COMPARISON OF 2019, 2022 & 2024 POINT IN TIME COUNT





SHELTER-TO-HOUSING

Homeless shelters in the County provide more than just beds for persons experiencing homelessness. Shelters are considered a gateway to housing and provide a variety of services to support people experiencing sheltered homelessness to obtain and sustain housing. On April 4, 2024, the County conducted a "point-intime" snapshot of the County's two shelters, Yale Navigation Center and Bridges at Kraemer Place, in an effort to understand the current state of the shelter-to-housing pipeline. The results were astonishing and spoke to the need to increase housing in the county for those experiencing homelessness.

Youth Homeless Demonstration Program (YHDP) NOFO

- On June 6, 2024, HUD announced the release of the YHDP NOFO.
- Approximately \$72 million is available nationally to support selected communities in the development and implementation of a coordinated community approach to preventing and ending youth homelessness.
- The Office of Care Coordination plans to build upon the application submitted for YHDP Round 7 funding, to capture progress made towards youth engagement in decision-making for the Orange County CoC and strengthen overall application for YHDP funding.
- The Office of Care Coordination, as the Collaborative Applicant of the Orange County CoC, will work closely with the Transitional Age Youth (TAY) Collaborative Committee, youth-specific service providers, and local community partners to receive community feedback and submit the application on behalf of the Orange County CoC.

Homeless Veterans on Veteran Registry



Currently, there are 221 veterans experiencing homelessness on the Veteran Registry. In the previous 12 months, 192 veterans have been housed in permanent, stable housing. Over 30 agencies, including the VA Community Resource and Referral Center, outreach providers, and shelter providers, continue to meet weekly to coordinate housing and services for veterans experiencing homelessness in Orange County. In the past 12 months, there has been a 10% decrease in the number of veterans experiencing homelesness in Orange County.
