# Background

- Data requests from organizations not participating in HMIS are required to be approved by the CoC Board prior to any data being released
- Request was originally presented to the CoC Board in June, and is returning for approval with additional information
  - CoC Board questions included how Advance OC would use the data and the HMIS policies in place for releasing data.
- Advance OC is requesting data from HMIS for research purposes to determine any correlation between homelessness and access to the justice system in Orange County.





# **Client Consent (Release of Information)**

- Client consent is valid for 7 years
  - Start date is the date the consent is signed by the client
  - End date is seven years from start date
- Clients can revoke consent at any time
- If consent is provided, record is visible to agencies participating in HMIS with access to data sharing
- If consent is refused or revoked, record is only visible to agencies that served the client directly, HMIS System Administrators, and the HMIS Vendor





# Research

- HUD does not require consent to share data for research purposes, and does not provide a time limit on data for research requests
- County Counsel recommends that only clients with an active consent during the reporting period be included in data requests
- Reporting period has been updated based on existing consent policies, and clients included in the request has been updated to reflect County Counsel guidance
  - Data Release policy will be updated in the future to reflect this, as well





# **Data Request Specifications**

- Reporting Period: January 1, 2017 through December 1, 2023.
- All adults active during reporting period with an active consent as of the end of the reporting period
- Client-level data is needed to complete analysis, excluding names or SSNs

Social Determinants of Justice: A Research Project Investigating Disparities in Civil Legal Outcomes

> Presented to the Orange County Continuum of Care Board September 25, 2024

## **Research Abstract**


Much like the concept of social determinants of health, studies have shown that there are social determinants of justice or conditions in which people are born, live, work, and age that influence their access to fair treatment, equitable resources, and opportunities within a society.

Investigating the social determinants of justice is worthwhile because findings from such research can help shape policies and interventions addressing the extent to which individuals and groups experience fairness, dignity, and protection under the law, as well as their access to legal systems and opportunities for redress.

The **focus** of our research will be on civil legal outcomes in three areas of law: domestic violence, consumer debt, and eviction. Each of these fields of law and the circumstances of these cases are directly related to the lived experiences of those who are housing insecure and/or homeless.

The **purpose** of our research is to better understand the homeless population, capture information that can be helpful to address service gaps for legal aid and provide insights that can help secure additional resources to address these service gaps for the most vulnerable populations in Orange County, especially the unhoused.

### Social Determinants of Justice Cited in Current Body of Knowledge



### Addressing a Community Need



Unlawful detainer (UD) defense is the #1 requested service of legal aid organizations, but we do not know if help is being requested by residents living in the neighborhoods most vulnerable to eviction. Understanding the homeless population better and Identifying social determinants will allow us to predict "community need," isolate any service gaps, and understand how best to serve those who are housing insecure.



Legal Aid organizations have difficulty ascertaining how and where to expand community-based efforts, including where to cultivate strategic partnerships, focus outreach strategies, and host clinic sites; Understanding the homeless population better and mapping social determinants will ensure that we are investing the right resources in the right communities and not duplicating efforts undertaken by other organizations.



Being able to share these research findings with funders and partners will help them more easily grasp the need for our work and the value of legal aid to low-income communities and communities of color experiencing housing insecurity or homelessness. That will help us to bring more resources – money and volunteers – to the table to serve the most vulnerable populations in Orange County.



### Benefits to the Community and Homelessness System of Care

Depending on the outcome of the data, this research project will illuminate issues around access to legal services that are critical to preventing homelessness, which can attract additional resources to the homelessness system of care.

By being able to better ascertain the need of the unhoused community for legal services and gaps in service, more support will be available to this population that can improve their living condition, allow for employment, and restore credit.

### 3.8.4 Standard Encryption Algorithm and Implementation

#### 3.8.4.1 Data at Rest

All data classified as Confidential and Restricted must be encrypted at rest. Encryption must be at least as strong as specified by NIST (current document NIST 800-175B) for data at rest, and in no case, should be weaker than AES-128. When possible, full disk (or device) encryption should be employed. When encryption is used, standard algorithms and implementations shall be employed.

#### 3.8.4.2 Data in Use

Encryption shall be applied to data in use in a manner commensurate with the associated risk or applicable industry requirements, such as the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health (HITECH), and Payment Card Industry Security Standards (PCI).

#### 3.8.4.3 Data in Transit

Remote access connections between AdvanceOC and external parties shall be encrypted. The latest TLS/SSL versions shall be used. TLS 1.1 or 1.2 is preferred, the latest SSL version if necessary. SSL v2.0 and TLS 1.0 may not be used. If earlier versions are required, associated risks must be evaluated and documented. Cryptographic attacks against TLS must be mitigated by choosing the least risky cipher suite for each version.

#### 3.8.4.4 Trusted Certificates

For public-facing systems and assets and services that require Transport Layer Security (TLS) / Secured Sockets Layer (SSL), only Public Key Infrastructure (PKI) certificates from commonly trusted certification authorities shall be used.

#### 3.8.4.5 Key Management

Access to cryptographic keys shall be restricted to as few AdvanceOC workforce members as possible. Access shall only be allowed after manager approval and the completion of the Agreement for Key Custodians form. Keys shall be stored in as few locations as possible, and those locations shall be dedicated to key storage.

### 3.8.4.6 Key Changes

Cryptographic keys shall be changed when they have reached the end of their crypto-period or in the event that a private key has been compromised or is suspected of being compromised.

### 3.9 Change Management

A formal change management process based on AdvanceOC's Change Management Standard shall be established and followed. All changes to hardware, software or any AdvanceOC system must have a change management request submitted and approved before the work is performed. Unless there is an emergency, of which the change can be documented post-implementation. Routine maintenance and break/fix work may not be subject to documentation requirements. We follow industry best practices for data security and management. We recently passed two separate security audits performed by the County of Orange in 2022 and 2023.

We are trusted partners with many large institutions in Orange County and require a BAA for all of our vendors. We hire a third-party cybersecurity firm to test our internal controls and conduct a penetration test annually.

EXHIBIT A TO AGREEMENT FOR PROVISION OF COVID-19 EQUITY MAPPING SERVICES BETWEEN COUNTY OF ORANGE AND ADVANCE OC

#### I. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE CONTRACT

A. GENERAL PROVISIONS AND RECITALS

1. The parties agree that the terms used, but not otherwise defined below in Paragraph B, shall have the same meaning given to such terms under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, Public Law 104-191 ("HIPAA"), the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act, Public Law 111-005 ("the HITECH Act"), and their implementing regulations at 45 CFR Parts 160 and 164 ("the HIPAA regulations") as they may exist now or be hereafter amended.

2. The parties agree that a business associate relationship under HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA regulations between the CONTRACTOR and COUNTY arises to the extent that CONTRACTOR performs, or delegates to subcontractors to perform, functions or activities on behalf of COUNTY pursuant to, and as set forth in, the Agreement that are described in the definition of "Business Associate" in 45 CFR § 160.103.

3. The COUNTY wishes to disclose to CONTRACTOR certain information pursuant to the terms of the Agreement, some of which may constitute Protected Health Information ("PHI"), as defined below in Subparagraph B.10, to be used or disclosed in the course of providing services and activities pursuant to, and as set forth, in the Agreement.

#### HOAG HIPAA BUSINESS ASSOCIATE AGREEMENT

(Supporting one or more Underlying Agreements, as defined in Section 1.7)

This Business Associate Agreement ("BAA") is entered into effective as of the date of the last signatory of this agreement ("Effective Date") by and between Advance OC ("Business Associate") and Hoag Memorial Hospital Presbyterian on behalf of itself and its affiliates (collectively, "Covered Entity") (each a "Party" and collectively, the "Parties").

#### RECITALS

A. Covered Entity is a "Covered Entity" as that term is defined under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (Public Law 104-91), as amended, ("**HIPAA**"), and the regulations promulgated thereunder by the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services ("**Secretary**"), including, without limitation, the regulations codified at 45 C.F.R. Parts 160 and 164 ("**HIPAA Regulations**");

B. Business Associate performs Services for or on behalf of Covered Entity, and in performing said Services, Business Associate creates, receives, maintains, or transmits Protected Health Information ("PHI") or Electronic Protected Health Information ("PHI");


C. The Parties intend to protect the privacy and provide for the security of PHI and/or ePHI Disclosed by Covered Entity to Business Associate, or received or created by Business Associate, when providing Services in compliance with HIPAA, the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act (Public Law 111-005) ("the **HITECH Act**") and its implementing regulations and guidance issued by the Secretary, and other applicable state and federal laws, all as amended from time to time; and

D. As a Covered Entity, Covered Entity is required under HIPAA to enter into a BAA with Business Associate that meets certain requirements with respect to the Use and Disclosure of PHI and/or ePHI, which are met by this BAA.

#### AGREEMENT

In consideration of the Recitals and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

## **Questions and Concerns of the Committee**

- 1. Is the goal for the data to be used in something similar to the Equity map? If yes, a quick review of the Equity map could be helpful for the group to see how the data would be used. The intent is not to replicate the Equity Map but to build something custom for CLA SoCal.
- 2. There is a lack of clarity regarding the ultimate goal and how it can be achieved with the data from the data request. What is the benefit of the CoC if Advance OC acquires the data? The goal of this data request is to (1) better understand the homeless population in order to help (2) provide better access to legal aid services that can be important in preventing homelessness and (3) depending on the outcome of the data analysis, help homeless/housing insecure and other vulnerable residents obtain additional resources to address any service gaps.
- 3. Is there a status update on receiving data from other sources? How many other entities were approached to request personally identifiable information (PII)? How many of those entities said yes to providing data? How successful has Advance OC been in previous data requests with other partners? We are preparing a series of 10.500 requests (Access to Judicial Records). Historically, we have received PII/PHI through executed Business Associate Agreements with multiple organizations including the County of Orange, OC Health Care Agency and others.
- 5. What is the role of Advance OC in regards to the research and data? Advance OC is the lead researcher. Advance OC will also have sole responsibility for safeguarding the data, de-identifying and anonymizing the data, analyzing and visualizing the data.
- 6. The address for some projects in HMIS does not reflect where the client is currently residing, it is the administrative office for the project. How will Advance OC handle this? We will not use the project address as the client home address. We will refer to the data dictionary for the appropriate use of data records received.
- 7. Why do you need data going back so far? To establish statistically significant trend lines, we need as much data as possible.

### Achieving Equity in Orange County

Health inequities are differences in health status or in the distribution of health resources among various populations. This is due to the social conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work, and age. Across Orange County (OC) we see differences in the length and quality of life; rates of disease, disability, and early death; severity of disease; and access to treatment because of these inequities.

Equity in OC is an OC Health Care Agency (HCA) initiative in collaboration and partnership with local Orange County community partners. Funded by a grant from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Equity in OC Initiative is a communityinformed and data-driven initiative to address health inequities and disparities in Orange County by laying the foundation for creating a healthier, more resilient, and equitable Orange County.

### Why Create Population Overviews?

These population overviews are snapshots of available data for various populations in Orange County. By laying out populationspecific data in these overviews, we can identify systemic changes that can improve the quality of life within these communities. ## **CoC Program NOFO: Priority Listing Project Tiering**



## **Inclement Weather Emergency Response Program Request for Proposals (RFP)**

# **Continuum of Care Update** Sarah Jones, CoC Manager, Office of Care Coordination

## **Outreach Grid Update**

- As the HMIS Lead, Orange County United Way has been working with the HOPE Center and Outreach Grid on an implementation plan to incorporate Outreach Grid data into HMIS.
- Incorporation of Outreach Grid data into HMIS will occur through **browser automation**, which is using software to complete data entry into HMIS.
  - This solution is not a data integration, and therefore doesn't require CoC Board approval.
- First phase of the plan: incorporate HOPE Center data from Outreach Grid into HMIS.
  - Expected to be live in HMIS in January 2025.
- After go live date in January 2025, Orange County United Way will present a full update to the CoC Board including next steps for other agencies participating in Outreach Grid.

## **CoC Strategic Investment Planning Update**

- In December 2023, the CoC Board approved the implementation of the Rehousing and Coordinated Investment Planning Tool – Capital (RCIPT-C) to support the Orange County CoC's strategic planning for current and future investment of resources.

Learned that HUD is no longer updating RCIPT-C
